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A DREAMER

MEMORY VERSE: "Arise, O Lord; O God, lift up thine hand: forget not the humble." Psalm 10:12.

Children often look and act like their parents. So it was with the ten older sons of Jacob. They were deceptive like their father and jealous like their mother. One of the sons was different. He was gentle, trusting, and pure in word and thought. He was an active, joyful child. He bravely did what he knew to be right. His father loved him very much, and their hearts were bound closely together. This young man of seventeen loved and served God. It made him sad to see his older brothers doing wrong. His name was Joseph.

MEMORY VERSE: "And the patriarchs, moved with envy, sold Joseph into Egypt: but God was with him." Acts 7:9.


Jacob's sons were shepherds who traveled from place to place to find the best pasture. Sometimes they had to travel many miles from home and did not see their father for several months. Soon after Joseph had his dreams, his brothers took the flocks to Shechem. Days went by, and Jacob began to worry about them. He called Joseph, who was always ready and willing to obey.

2. With a happy heart, Joseph said goodbye to his father and went to Shechem. Even though he had traveled more than 50 miles and was tired, he gladly hurried 15 miles further to Dothan. When his brothers saw him coming, what did they say to each other? Genesis 37:19, 20.

IN POTIPHAR'S HOUSE

MEMORY VERSE: "In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths." Proverbs 3:6.

Poor Joseph! In the distance he can see where his father's tents are. Bitterly he weeps. Will he ever see his father again? He can still see the faces of his angry brothers. Now he is a helpless slave on his way to Egypt. He feels lonely. Sadness and terror fill his heart. Now his thoughts turn to the precious lessons he has learned at home. Jesus will help in every time of trouble. He gives himself fully to God and prays that He will lead and guide him in this land where he will be a stranger. He makes up his mind to be true to God in everything he does. In God's own time he will see that the way He leads is best.

In the smallest duties Joseph worked as if he were working for the King of heaven. It is because he did his best that the Lord blessed him and made everything prosper in his hand. God never blesses carelessness or unfaithfulness. Joseph's life showed to the heathen the difference between one who worships the true God and one who worships idols

- 4. What will God do for us if we acknowledge Him? Proverbs 3:6.



IN THE KING'S PRISON

MEMORY VERSE: "But the Lord was with Joseph, and shewed him mercy, and gave him favour in the sight of the keeper of the prison." Genesis 39:21.

Joseph was put into a dark, gloomy prison. Potiphar knew that Joseph was faithful and pure, but he had him put into prison to please his wife. At first Joseph was treated harshly by the jailer. This did not make him cross or distrustful because he knew he had done nothing wrong. Satan could not discourage him. Even in prison he found work to do. He helped and comforted the prisoners. What he saw in the prison taught him to treat others justly and wisely.


Pharaoh was very disappointed when his wise men could not explain his dreams. It must have been hard for him to seek help from a Hebrew slave and prisoner. Yet he was willing to do anything to bring peace to his troubled mind. Even though the king was in a hurry, Joseph stopped to shave and change his clothes before he appeared before the king. He wanted Pharaoh to think well of the God of heaven. Sometimes we are untidy and careless in dress. We dishonor God by doing this. We must remember we are witnesses for Jesus.

 When Joseph appeared before Pharaoh, Pharaoh said he had heard Joseph could interpret dreams. What did Joseph answer? Genesis 41:16.

FAMINE

MEMORY VERSE: "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose." Romans 8:28.

The famine was great also in Canaan. Jacob and his sons heard there was plenty of food in Egypt. Jacob sent ten of his sons to buy corn, but he kept Benjamin home for fear something might happen to him.

1. What did Jacob's sons do when they appeared before Joseph? Genesis 42:6.

2. What did Joseph call them? Genesis 42:9.

3. Joseph recognized his brothers, but they did not know him. He told them to send for their youngest brother. For three days they were cast in prison. During this time they thought of their past sins and cruelty to Joseph. These were three days of sorrow and repentance for them. They were sure God was punishing them. What did Joseph say they must do? Genesis 42:18, 20.

Joseph could now see that his brothers were no longer envious, deceptive, and cruel but unselfish and true to one another and thoughtful of their father.

He had been the rebel chief of the cruel treatment done to Joseph.

6. The sons returned and told Jacob all that had happened. What did Jacob say? Genesis 42:36-38.



SECOND JOURNEY TO EGYPT

MEMORY VERSE: "A NEW HEART ALSO WILL I GIVE YOU, AND A NEW SPIRIT WILL I PUT WITHIN YOU: AND I WILL TAKE AWAY THE STONY HEART OUT OF YOUR FLESH, AND I WILL GIVE YOU AN HEART OF FLESH." EZEKIEL 36:26.

The famine continued. Day after day, the food supply grew smaller. Soon the children would be crying for food. Jacob's sons knew it would be no use to go to Egypt without Benjamin. Jacob saw their need and said, "Go again; buy us a little food."

1. What did Judah say? Genesis 43:3, 8-10.

3. Jacob had come to a trial. He did not know what would happen. What promise of God did he claim? Can we claim this promise? Psalm 37:5.

5. Joseph's brothers were afraid when they were brought to Joseph's house. They explained how they found the money in their sacks. What did the steward tell them? Genesis 43:23.



- 6. The steward brought Simeon out of prison. When Joseph came home at noon, they gave him the present from their father. What did Joseph do when he saw Benjamin this time? Genesis 43:29, 30.
- 7. When Joseph thought he could control his feelings, he washed his face and returned. He told the steward to put dinner on the tables. How were they set at the tables? Genesis 43:32-34.

It was an Egyptian law that they were not to eat with people of any other nation. The brothers were amazed to see that they were seated in the exact order of their ages. They also noticed that Benjamin received more than the others. Joseph wanted to find out of his brothers had feelings of envy and hatred toward Benjamin.

- 8. Early the next morning, the happy brothers left for home. Their joy was soon turned to sorrow. Why? What had they promised? Genesis 44:2, 6-9, 12.
- 9. The troubled brothers rent their garments in sorrow. They returned to Joseph and bowed before him. Judah remembered he had pledged himself as surety for Benjamin. He tenderly spoke of his father's great grief at the loss of his son Joseph and how hard it had been for him to let Benjamin go. Joseph saw that his brothers were truly sorry for their sin. What did he do? Genesis 45:1-4, 7-9, 14, 15.





ISRAEL IN EGYPT

MEMORY VERSE: "BEHOLD, THE EYE OF THE LORD IS UPON THEM THAT FEAR HIM, UPON THEM THAT HOPE IN HIS MERCY; TO DELIVER THEIR SOUL FROM DEATH, AND TO KEEP THEM ALIVE IN FAMINE." PSALM 33:18, 19.


"Joseph's brothers have come." This news delighted Pharaoh. He told Joseph to send wagons and food and bring his father and brothers to Egypt. Joseph knew Satan would tempt them to lay the blame for past sins on one another. He warned them, "See that ye fall not out by the way".

- 1. What news could Jacob not believe? Genesis 45:26.
- After hearing all the words of Joseph, what did Jacob exclaim? Genesis 45:28.
- As Jacob journeyed to Egypt, God talked to him in a vision. He told him not to fear but to go to Egypt, for He would make of him a great nation. Describe the happy meeting of Jacob and Joseph. Genesis 46:28-30.

4.	Joseph told Pharaoh his father and brothers had come. What did Pharaoh tell five of Joseph's brothers? Genesis 47:2-6.
	Joseph feared the king might want to give his brothers positions in government. He feared this would lead them into many temptations and idolatry. The Egyptians hated shepherds, so he told his brothers to tell the king they were shepherds if he asked their occupation.
5.	Joseph introduced his father to Pharaoh. What did Pharaoh ask? What did Jacob answer? Genesis 47:7-10.
	Jacob's saying his years had been few and evil meant he had seen much trouble and suffering. His life had not been very happy. His answer also showed that he was a pilgrim on this earth.
6.	When the people had no more money, what did they give for food? Genesis 47:17, 19.
	Joseph bought all the land of Egypt for Pharaoh. The famine was so great that all the people were moved to the cities. The land given to the priests was not bought nor was the land of Goshen, which had been given to Joseph's brothers. Pharaoh knew it was through the mercy of the God of Joseph that Egypt had plenty and other nations were suffering from famine. Also he saw Joseph was making his kingdom very rich.

7. What plan was arranged whereby the Egyptians should work the land? Genesis 47:23, 24.

8. Who will care for us in famine? Psalm 33:18, 19.





THE LAST DAYS OF JACOB AND JOSEPH

MEMORY VERSE: "For the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first." 1 Thessalonians 4:16.

Joseph's wife was an Egyptian princess. Because of this, Joseph's sons would become Egyptian priests if they should choose to stay with the Egyptians. They would have wealth and honor because their father was next to the king. Joseph would rather have his sons counted among the people of God than to have all the honors of the court of Egypt. He knew God's promises were worth more than all the glory and wealth of Egypt.


1. What kind of a man was Job? Job 1:1.

GREAT CALAMITIES

MEMORY VERSE: "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour." 1 Peter 5:8.

Satan received permission to tempt Job. He was sure he could get him to fall, just as he succeeded with Adam and Eve. Job was a happy and prosperous man. The time came when this changed.

1. One day a messenger came rushing to Job in great excitement. What did he tell him? Job 1:14, 15.

2. Scarcely had the first messenger told his story of the cattle thieves when a second messenger arrived with fear showing on his face. What news did he bring? Job 1:16.

3. What a fearful storm! He was still thinking about this horrible thing when a third messenger arrived. What bad news did he bring? Job 1:17.

Camels are very valuable. A man's wealth was counted by how many he had. This was a great loss—enough to shake anyone.



4. Now another messenger arrived. What terrible news did he bring? Job 1:18, 19.

5. What did Job do? Did he blame God for all these calamities? Job 1:20-22 6. Job never wavered, even when he couldn't understand why God allowed such trials. He trusted in God's goodness just the same. He suffered without a murmur. Satan was furious and again appeared before God. He excused his failure by saying he did not have a fair chance. What did Satan say to God? Job 2:4. 5. 7. What did God answer? Job 2:6. 8. Satan returned to earth. What did he do to Job? Job 2:7. 9. Whom do we have to watch out for? 1 Peter 5:8.



THE REWARD OF PATIENCE

MEMORY VERSE: "BEHOLD, WE COUNT THEM HAPPY WHICH ENDURE. YE HAVE HEARD OF THE PATIENCE OF JOB, AND HAVE SEEN THE END OF THE LORD; THAT THE LORD IS VERY PITIFUL, AND OF TENDER MERCY." JAMES 5:11.

The big test was on. How would Job stand? The boils were very painful. He couldn't stand, sit, or lie comfortably. Week after week the torture continued.

- 3. But his friends did not bring much comfort. They were sure Job must be a great sinner. What did they say? Job 5:17; 8:20.
- 4. Job continued to declare he was innocent. What did he say? Job 13:15, first part; 16:20; 17:9; 19:25.
- 5. When Job's friends finished talking, God broke in and answered Job out of a whirlwind. He talked of the wonders of His creation. He loved Job for his humility. What did God tell Job's three friends? Job 42:7, 8.
